### Father Flanagan Canonization Effort Moving Forward

he canonization effort for Boys Town's founder, Father Flanagan, is reaching the second of three reviews of his case at the Vatican's Congregation for the Causes of Saints. His historical commission review was completed nearly two years ago, and he passed it with flying colors.

The theological commission review should be completed by the end of 2022. And the Father Flanagan League Society of Devotion which was established by the Boys Town National Alumni Association, is hopeful the third and final review will be held in 2023. If Father Flanagan receives an endorsement by the Congregation for the Causes of Saints after this third review, it is likely the Pope will declare Father as Venerable Edward J. Flanagan.

Since the canonization process began in 1999, the Flanagan League has received 25 reports of alleged miracles, some involving BT alumnus. Medical records are currently being gathered for two cases the League hopes to further investigate. The reason the Catholic

Church includes proven miracles as part of the canonization process is their desire to have supernatural proof that the person is truly with Jesus Christ in heaven before they


declare them to be a saint.

The Flanagan League is producing a major broadcast biographic documentary about Father Flanagan with the help of an Emmy Award winning film crew. Actor Jim Caviezel, who played Jesus in the film *The Passion of the Christ*, is slated to narrate the production. The League is still raising funds to help with worldwide distribution of the film and to have it released in several foreign languages.

Boys Town alumni initiated this cause and the League hopes individuals will contribute financially to this effort to see Father Flanagan's canonization effort to the finish line.

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
he Boys Town Alumni Office and the Boys Town

This award recognizes a young alumnus who has achieved substantial professional growth and advancement over a short period of time, made significant contributions to the professional world or community and represents the values and principles of Boys Town and the Boys Town National Alumni Association.

The Honorary National President Award was given to Daniel Schneiss. Dan is a retired Boys Town coach and teacher who has provided significant service to the Alumni Association through considerable efforts in support of the goals and projects of the Alumni Association.

The weekend also consisted of a Veterans Memorial Program where the flag was presented by the Boys Town JROTC. Alumni and family honored each branch of the armed services with its own service song where members of each branch assumed the position of "attention" during the duration of their song. Alumni Service Members were given the opportunity to speak at the event.

### John Deases, '92, A Boys Town Pilgrim Who Found a New Life

oung John Deases, '92, was at loose ends in his life when he found his way from Dallas, Texas to Iowa. His journey to a new state was so he could live with his brother to escape a less than desirable home situation. Once he got there, he learned of Boys Town in Omaha and asked his brother to arrange a visit for him. Boys Town welcomed him with open arms, and he became a citizen with a new lease on his future.

Like many young boys and girls arriving at Boys Town, Deases found change initially hard to deal with.

"The rules and structure of Boys Town were especially tough, as I came from a family without any rules or stable parents," he said. "Things like learning I need to go to bed on time, and the point card system were items that actually helped me succeed later on in life."

After adapting to the program of care, Deases began to fit right in and take advantage of the many opportunities that were offered.

"Going to (Lake) Okoboji was one of the best places during the summer where I learned so many fun outdoor water sports," Deases said. "Also, participating in organized sports like football, wrestling and baseball, had a huge impact on me regarding my self-esteem and confidence. I came from a place where being in sports wasn't highly encouraged. I was fortunate to letter in all three sports my sophomore, junior and senior years. The Boys Town Letterman's Club allowed me to give back by letting me serve concessions during junior varsity and varsity events."

Wrestling was a key sport for Deases and he excelled. But early in his senior year, Deases met with adversity that changed his life and set him on a new path.

"Unfortunately, my wrestling season tanked in my senior year after I tore the ACL in my knee," he said. "So, I knew I had to rely on my academics."

The Boys Town family life was also enormously important in shaping Deases' future.

"Chris and Lori Mathsen were my Family-Teachers®," he said. "They taught me so much on how to become a good man, father and husband. Also, I had many good teachers, but my favorite was my English teacher for ninth

grade, Mrs. Anderson. She taught me so much beyond the classroom, including making time for those you care about, and having compassion for others. However, the most influential person was Coach Doug Denson. I give Coach Denson credit for helping me become a warrior on the mat and in life. Besides being my wrestling coach, Coach Denson helped shape and mold me to be the man that I have become today. "

Deases says his Boys Town experience changed his life.

"Being a man without a proper father was hard but the structure, sports, and special relationships at Boys Town taught me to be able to overcome obstacles and face adversity throughout life,"

Deases graduated in 1997 from the University of Nebraska-Omaha with a major in Criminal Justice. He became a correctional officer in Omaha.

Deases' vision for his future includes giving back to the community.

"I want to work with a ministry called the Victory Boxing Club," Deases said. "It is a not-for-profit Christian boxing club based in the heart of South Omaha which pours Christian principles into participants through the art of boxing. The reason I would like to do this is because I believe God gave me a second chance by letting me find my way to Boys Town. In turn, I want to help under-privileged youth become law-abiding citizens and make a difference in the world."

Deases came to Boys Town because he wanted a better life. He got that and now he is helping others who have made wrong choices to build a new life for themselves. This Boys Town pilgrim is paying it forward through his work and life.

"Coming to Boys Town was one of the best decisions I've ever made." Deases said.
