2018 Boys Town Alumni Sports Hall of Fame Inducts Five

This year's Boys Town Alumni Sports Hall of Fame class has five members.


The five were inducted into the Hall of Fame at the annual Booster Banquet on May 1, 2018. Their performances on the field of play at Boys Town have earned them the honor of joining a long list of athletes from the school's storied athletic teams. Sports have always been a major part of the program of opportunity for Boys Town youth and these inductees represent the best of the best.

Ronald J. White, Class of 1966, arrived at Boys Town on August 5, 1959, from Omaha, Nebraska, at the age of 12. White's potential as a basketball player was immediately apparent. In addition to his prowess on the hardwood, White had an outstanding singing voice and became a member of the famed touring Boys Town Concert Choir. White was a Commissioner in his senior year in Boys Town's program of self-government.

In high school, White was a natural for the varsity basketball team and earned his first varsity letter as a freshman. He was a four-year varsity letterman on the basketball team and a member of the varsity letter club and "B" Club all four years. As a sophomore, White earned a minor letter in track and a varsity letter as a senior.

In 1965, the basketball team began the season with a win that would eventually lead to back-to-back Nebraska Class A State championships for Coach George Pfeifer, '44. The Cowboys were a force to be reckoned with on the court and White, a forward on the team, was instrumental in cementing the championship in 1965. Boys Town ended the season with a record of 22-2. For his efforts, White received honorable mention on the Omaha World-Herald All-State team. He, along with teammate Jim Hester, was named by the Lincoln Journal Star to that newspaper's All-Tournament team. White's highest scoring production came against Council Bluffs Thomas Jefferson High School during the Metro Holiday tournament when he scored 37 points.

In 1966, White had an even better year as the Cowboy basketball team garnered its second State Championship. For his efforts, he was chosen by the Omaha World-Herald, Lincoln Journal Star and Associated Press for their All-State teams, and he was named a Scholastic Magazine All-American. White was also named to the All-Tournament team for the second year. White finished his basketball career with a total of 1,306 points. He was captain of the team

during the state tournament in 1966. In his senior year, White was awarded the Munroe Trophy for outstanding performance on the basketball court and the T.H. Wolf Memorial Award for Citizenship.

After high school, White attended college briefly and worked in the Omaha area, mostly with the Omaha Public School District, until his retirement. When notified of his selection for the Alumni Sports Hall of Fame, White was humbled and excited to be recognized by his alma mater. In 2013, White was inducted into the Nebraska Black Sports Hall of Fame, joining the likes of Bob Gibson, Johnny Rogers, Bob Boozer and Boys Town teammate Ken Geddes, '66.

Sadly, on February 28, 2018, White passed away suddenly and was subsequently memorialized at a service at Boys Town's Garden of the Bible on March 17, 2018.

Nathaniel L. McKinney, Class of 1968, arrived at Boys Town on September 12, 1963, from Fresno, California. He took to sports and was a standout athlete in his grade school years. This foretold a bright future in Boys Town athletics. In addition to his athletic achievements, McKinney sang in the school choir. He was class secretary in his freshman and sophomore years.

In high school, McKinney earned three varsity letters in football and basketball and a varsity letter in track as a sophomore, while also earning minor letters in football, basketball and track as a freshman. He was a member of the 1966 State Championship basketball and State Championship football teams, and he was a member of the varsity lettermen's club and "B" Club for three years.

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Alumni Profile Robert D. Mindlin, '89

Robert Mindlin, '89, began his more than six-year tenure at Boys Town much the same as many others. With his family broken by divorce, he slowly drifted into juvenile delinquency.

"My family and the courts were fed up with my behavior and decided to take action," he said. "I had just turned 12 when my father dropped me off at Boys Town. It was March 10, 1983."

Right away, Mindlin worked hard to learn the Boys Town Social Skills Model.

"I learned to make eye contact, shake hands, fill out a point card, say OK and check back," Mindlin said. "I realized my problems were microscopic compared to others, and many of the other kids were far less fortunate than me. I understood early, we needed to learn from each other.

Mindlin found the structure of accountability suited him well.

"It was up to me to improve," he said. "And Boys Town offered plenty of tools and support to allow that to happen."

Mindlin found his primary outlet in athletics at the Palrang Field House with teammates and friends.

"We shared so much together; trophies and tears," Mindlin said. "We grew up together like a pride of lions. They are still my friends and brothers."

Without the positive influence of coaches, like the recently deceased Dave Benedict, Mindlin and his teammates would not have excelled.

"The coaching staff through the years was exceptional and deserves the lion's share of credit for my ability to perform on the fields of competition," he said. "I give them the highest praise, and thank them for everything they did for us. My fondest memories are being part of the Cowboys and their long tradition of excellence."

Mindlin enrolled in Boys Town's vocational training program, studying Culinary Arts.

"I was privileged to serve governors, senators and first ladies," Mindlin said. "We entertained professional athletes, movie stars, religious leaders and socialites. Our boys worked at many of the local restaurants and country clubs. I still use many of the recipes I learned in class."

Mindlin worked on the Boys Town farm in the summers.

"I loved spending summer days at the horse farm, riding horses in the arena or on the trail," he said. "I personally witnessed a change in behavior and attitude of many youth after they learned farm skills

Perez, '99, Overcomes Adversity to Be Named Educator of the Year

Boys Town Senior Advisor for Alumni Matters, John Mollison, had a chance to interview Antonio Perez, '99, on his incredible life journey. Here is that interview.

JM: Antonio, when did you get to Boys Town and how is it that you ended up here?

AP: I arrived at Boys Town from South Omaha in the summer of 1994, a week or two after turning 13 years old. I was caught up with gangs and drugs and I was basically raising my younger siblings on my own. I had two younger siblings already living at Boys Town and I was at a pivotal time in my life. My grandfather came over one day and made me pack a backpack of clothes for myself and some clothes for my two youngest siblings. He put us in his truck, took us out to the Boys Town police station, and instructed us to get out of the truck and go inside. When he left, I went inside and explained to the police officer what had happened. He placed me in an interrogation room alone for a while before returning to tell me the news: I could stay, but my siblings were too young and needed to go. I called my grandfather, who returned to Boys Town and pleaded with me to stay. Reluctantly, I relented as my grandfather took my siblings out of the police station and headed back to South Omaha.

JM: Every Boys Town alumnus has special memories. What were some of yours?

AP: My most memorable experiences centered around athletics, football in particular. I was fortunate enough to be a part of the teams that turned Boys Town's football programs around in the 1990s. We went from losing every game my ninth-grade year, to vinning one game my tenth-grade year, to records of 8-4 and 10-2 my last two years, each time making the state playoffs. The bond created with those young men on those teams is something I cherish to this day. Another great experience was the class of 1999 in general. We truly were a special group. We had many individuals who were in Boys Town for four-plus years, some as long as nine years! That simply doesn't happen very often.

JM: There are special people at Boys Town who stay with you through thick and thin. Who were those people for you and how did they influence you?

AP: I was blessed to have the same Family-Teachers[®], Brett and Anita Bigger, all five years at Boys Town, and my Assistant Family-Teacher[®], as well, which is very rare. They were great to me and provided me with much needed stability. My biggest influences, however, were a few of my friends that I graduated with and went to college with. Coach Kevin Kush was another. Coach Kush instilled in me the value of hard work and perseverance. He gave me the first platform in my life that provided me with any type of measurable success. Success on the football field gave me the confidence and the drive to continue to pursue success beyond high school.

JM: It is always hard to condense all your experiences into a single main lesson in life, but give it a try. What were the most important lessons you learned at Boys Town?

AP: Through football I learned how to be accountable, work hard, and create bonds with young men my age and how to lead others. I also learned to be thankful for the opportunities God has given.

JM: How did the skills you acquired at Boys Town contribute to helping you in your personal and professional life?

AP: Boys Town taught me how to say OK, even in times of difficulty. It is a skill I still have to use to this day. It also taught me how to be respectful at all times and how to have healthy relationships with others, to name a few. Without these skills, I wouldn't be able to serve my students at school, raise my children well or respect my wife. These skills were necessary for me to grow as an individual who, at one time, respected few people.

JM: Choosing your path in life is always difficult, but sometimes it is made more difficult by the circumstances of your life. What career did you pursue after graduation from Boys Town, and where has it led you?

AP: After Boys Town I went to college at the University of Nebraska-Kearney. After changing my major several times, I decided to pursue a degree in Education. In 2005, I graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in education with endorsements in physical education (K-12), history (7-12) and coaching. I accepted a job as an elementary school PE teacher for five

years in Omaha. I started a master's program in counseling, beginning my career as an elementary school counselor. In 2012, I earned my Master's Degree from the University of Nebraska-Omaha and took a job at Omaha South High School, where I have been ever since.

JM: As a school counselor, I imagine you see many of the same types of problems with students today that you faced as a young boy before coming to Boys Town. What do you see as the main challenges facing the youth you are working with today?

AP: Working as a counselor with today's youth, I see many of the same challenges from when I was young. Technology has magnified problems that were already present and I believe it is the scapegoat for the human condition today. At the end of the day, the students I serve still want to be respected, cared for and loved. Kids in poverty and dealing with severe trauma grow up way too fast and deal with too much at a young age. I task myself with coming to work each day trying to make a difference in each of my student's lives, being that person who hears them, inspires them and pushes them to pursue their dreams. My goal is for them to leave my office feeling better than when they entered, even if it's simply making them smile!

JM: This past March you were honored by being named Educator of the Year by the Office of Multicultural Affairs at the University of Nebraska-Kearney. How were you selected for that award?



Over his career, he set Boys Town's record for most touchdowns. In his junior and senior years, McKinney was awarded the Ike Mahoney Award and the award for Outstanding Running Back. He was a football team captain as a senior and earned Athlete of the Year in 1968, while also garnering the Golden Helmet Award for his performance on the football field. At the end of the 1967 season, McKinney was named to the Class A Nebraska All-State football team by the Lincoln Journal Star and Omaha World-Herald. McKinney was selected as a member of the South Squad for the Nebraska Shrine Bowl as a running back. He received a football scholarship to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Answering the call to help his family, McKinney left college to assist them and gave up his athletic career.

He worked in a number of different jobs prior to finding his life calling as a juvenile probation officer for Fresno County in California. He worked for 32 years making a difference in his community and constructively influencing thousands of young children before retiring in 2006. He received a number of awards, including the Fresno County Employee of the Month, and earned recognition from the United Way of Fresno for his contributions to the betterment of the community.

McKinney is the proud father of four children. He and his wife, Martha, were married in 2004. They attended the Biennial Alumni Reunion in July 2017 to help celebrate Boys Town's 100th Anniversary. McKinney is a Lifetime Member of the Boys Town National Alumni Association.

Thomas C. Robbins, Class of 1964, arrived at Boys Town with his younger brother, Frank, on January 20, 1960, from Council Bluffs, Iowa. Thomas Robbins enrolled in the heating and

air conditioning program at Boys Town's trade school, participated in scouting, completed the junior lifesaving course and took part in many of Boys Town's intramural sports programs. He was a Commissioner in Boys Town's program of self-government as a senior.

It was on the football field where Robbins made his mark in Boys Town athletics. He earned varsity letters as a junior and senior and was named to the Omaha All-Metro and Nebraska All-State teams during the undefeated, 10-0, 1963 season. He was selected as an All-American at the right tackle position, received the Coach Palrang Outstanding Lineman Award and was named as one of the 11 best high school football players in Nebraska. Robbins and five of his teammates were selected to play in the annual Nebraska Shrine Bowl game, and he earned a football scholarship to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. There, he earned a letter as part of the freshman football team before being drafted into the U.S. Army.

Robbins served for two years in Army Intelligence and played football for the Army while stationed in Germany. Settling in Massachusetts after his stint in the service, Robbins worked in the building trades, was a commercial fisherman, played semi-pro football and coached youth football. After retiring, he volunteered to help provide transportation to people with physical, mental and/or cognitive disabilities.

Robbins passed away on May 2, 2008, in Chelsea, Massachusetts. He was a Lifetime Member of the Boys Town National Alumni Association.

David L. McGuire, Class of 1965, arrived at Boys Town on November 2, 1960, from Henderson, Kentucky. He found sports to be a strong suit and excelled on the field of play. He studied the shoe repair trade at Boys Town's trade school and was a Councilman and Commissioner in Boys Town's program of self-government as a senior. In addition to his athletic pursuits, he sang in the Boys Town Concert Choir.

McGuire earned three varsity letters in basketball and track and a varsity letter as a senior in football, where he played quarterback. As a member of the basketball team, McGuire was a key figure in winning the Nebraska Class A State Championship in 1965. He was the leading scorer on the team and earned All-State honors from the Omaha World-Herald, Lincoln Journal Star, Associated Press and Scottsbluff Star-Herald. He received the Munroe Trophy for outstanding performance in basketball and was named the Outstanding Athlete of the Year for 1965. McGuire was a member of the state champion mile relay team.

McGuire passed away on December 15, 1990, at the age of 43, and is buried in Henderson, Kentucky.

and received a wage for their hard work. We had our gardens at the farm as well. Father Flanagan was wise when he picked such fertile ground because we grew some amazing varieties of garden fruits and vegetables. The practical skills, work ethic and lessons learned in agriculture have served me well in my life. No wonder the Bible uses shepherding and farming in so many stories and parables."

Mindlin cites religion at Boys Town as a significant influence in his life.

"The most impressive trait of Boys Town is how we put God first in our priority list," he said. "I loved to go to religion class and was proud that we could have prayer in school. We actually learned to study the Bible, not just read it. We learned tolerance for all religions and studied theology. Before and after every game in sports, we said our prayers. Every meal in the house was preceded with prayer. God is still my number one priority."

He gives much credit to the Family-Teachers® and their assistants for being there for him.

"They never gave up on me, and allowed me to be myself," Mindlin said "They taught us to cook, do laundry and properly clean house. We learned to budget, make weekly menus and shop frugally. Family-Teachers are the heart and soul of Boys Town's program."

After graduating, Mindlin moved to Austin, Texas. He worked in the construction industry in and around Austin and is now semi-retired.

"I love to hunt, fish and play golf," he said. "I have other interests like riding motorcycles, scuba diving, snorkeling and traveling."

Mindlin has coached youth athletics and shares the lessons he learned at Boys Town with his teams. He is also a caregiver for his widowed, aging mother. Trying a new venture, Mindlin said he also loves to write scripts and has been learning to film, edit and produce small independent films.

"Boys Town gave me many things," Mindlin said. "Some things I could never really repay in full. In hindsight, I wish I would have taken advantage of more the Home had to offer. Boys Town instilled in me the ability to accept myself for who I was, caring for and giving to others less fortunate, even when they are not always thankful.
