

DEAR ALUMNI,

Welcome to 2021.

Without a doubt, the year 2020 may long be remembered as the year we all want to forget. So many events changed the way we do things, possibly for the rest of our lives. It is yet to be seen, but being optimistic, hopefully some of those events may actually lead to changing our world for the better.

While the pandemic definitely changed things for our kids on campus, it wasn't the only event that led us to reassess and revamp how best to serve children, families and communities here at Boys Town. The racial justice protests that sprung up across the country were a reminder of how many citizens still feel vulnerable, alienated and marginalized.

In his day, Father Flanagan was the target of threats, intimidation and condemnation because he dared to welcome every child, regardless of color, faith or nationality, into his Home. He rejected all forms of discrimination, and Boys Town was better and stronger because of it.

Today, we're strengthening our equality efforts by expanding our diversity, equity and inclusion strategies to include the creation of special employee resource groups, a diversity speaker series, a variety of staff training and recruitment efforts, and other measures that foster greater awareness and understanding of diversity issues.

The protests also laid bare how much divisiveness and mistrust exist in our communities. To counter the anger and vitriol and promote a more just, peaceful, and equitable society, we launched a nationwide #TEACHLOVE campaign. Through social media, community events and individual action, this movement is dedicated to fostering a more tolerant and understanding world.

On campus, I marvel every Spring at the change and awakening that happens during this time of year. Not only does the earth reawaken after the winter slumber and give us the hope that new and warmer days are ahead, but our Boys Town kids seem to become energized with the promise of their future. This is especially true of our senior class as they continue to prepare for their lives after Boys Town.

This year's seniors will face a challenging world beset by many of the issues of 2020 and their own challenges of making the difficult choice to create a new life for themselves. They will need all the encouragement and support you can give them through your prayers as they face their own personal and difficult choices.

Out of an abundance of caution and concern for the health of its membership and our campus family, the BTNAA has moved this summer's reunion to 2022.

Let's hope we are growing closer to a return to normalcy. I'm hoping 2022 will allow us to all come together once again.

Hamilton, '65, Helps Organize Food Donation

hanks to Melvin Hamilton, '65, in partnership with The Black 14 Philanthropy and Latter-day Saint Charities. an estimated 40,000 pounds of food was delivered to the Boys Town warehouse on November, 18, 2020.

"This is a wonderful, thoughtful donation. especially considering the difficult times we are going through" said Father Steven Boes, Boys Town President and National

Executive Director, "Our sincere thanks go out to everyone involved."

The collaboration between The Black 14 Philanthropy and Latter-day Saint Charities had an unlikely beginning. Hamilton was one of 14 members of the 1969 University of Wyoming football team who were dismissed from the squad after discussing protesting policy of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints. The group later became known as The Black 14 and have recently formed a philanthropic organization.

"When you go through something like that, a lot of people get hurt. A lot of organizations get hurt. I must do everything I can to plaster all the cracks made in the walls of that relationship. All it

"I want people to understand the loving relationship that The Black 14 and The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints are trying to initiate. I want people to realize that we're working together, and will continue to work together, to strengthen the love between people even people with differences."

With the donation, both Nebraska and Iowa In Home Family Services organized the delivery of groceries to families in need before the holidays. The rest was utilized on the home campus.

Boys Town Alumni Director Tony Jones said Hamilton deserved credit for thinking of his former home.

"We would like to again thank Melvin Hamilton for choosing Boys Town as the destination for this outstanding donation," Jones said. "Without his thoughtfulness, this would have never happened."

FATHER BOES REFLECTS

Like many of you, I was shocked to see the January 6 attack on the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C. I have spent many hours walking the halls of Congress, fighting for the rights of our troubled kids and families. This mob did indeed desecrate our great temple of democracy.

As I struggled to decide how we should react to this event at Boys Town, I was challenged and edified by the talks given in January in honor of Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., by our own General Counsel, Dana Washington, and our Alumni Director, Tony Jones. They both reminded me of the Legacy of Teaching Love and Non-Violence left to us by Dr. King. He chose actions that revealed racism for the evil it was and helped educate the public. He forced white America to confront its own racism. He took peaceful action that would lead to justice. He gathered like-minded people together and fought for legislation that could make lasting change. As Dana summarized, Dr. King challenged us to Learn, Lead, Leap and Lean.

I believe this is the right path for Boys Town going forward:

That has been the focus of our Diversity, Inclusion and Equity mandatory and optional trainings and the formation of our new Employee Research Groups. I have been spending a lot of time lately reading books about the systemic racism in our Child Welfare, Juvenile Justice, Education and Behavioral Health systems.

Like Father Flanagan, we will start by creating a place where everyone is welcome, shown love and treated fairly and included. We will begin by looking at ourselves as Boys Town and asking hard questions like, "Why are there not more minorities at top

executive leadership positions?" Leading means setting an example that encourages people to follow.

Together with our Director of Advocacy, Margaret Vacek, we are putting together a plan to harness the power of our employees, donors and board members to take political action on behalf of America's hurting kids and families. You will be seeing emails from us about the issues we see as important and you may occasionally be asked to send an email to your legislator at the State and National level asking for their vote on important bills. Your participation is voluntary, but we can no longer stand by and let the lobbyists and big donors to political campaigns influence legislation that hurts our kids and their families.

We can't do this important work alone. Boys Town belongs to several local and national associations that are also working to harness their political power. Together, we can start a movement of child-serving agencies and hospitals who stand up for what is right.

This work honors and continues Father Flanagan's mission and our mission of "Changing the way America Cares for Children and Families."

DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS,

Your Alumni Association Board of Directors met in mid-October and the Reunion Committee presented a range of options for hosting the **2021 35th Biennial Reunion** as scheduled at Boys Town.

Among the recommendations was to either:
1) proceed as scheduled; 2) Scale back the reunion (Cancel the Saturday night banquet to the non-refundable deposit); 3) Delay until July 2022; 4) Delay until July 2023.

A meeting was held in December and the recommendation was to delay the reunion, one year, to **July 22-24, 2022.**

It was a decision not made lightly, and the committee and the board recognized the need to proceed with an abundance of caution as our nation works its way out of this pandemic. We will work with the representatives of the 25- and 50-Year Reunion classes to look at an option for a "Virtual Reunion" for each of the four classes affected.

Your board appreciates your understanding and consideration for the need to make this decision to protect the health and welfare of our alumni brothers and sisters.

We will, however, hold elections for board positions that come open in 2021. That

process will follow the normal routine outlined in our by-laws. If you are interested in running for a position on the board, I encourage you to contact any member of the board or Tony Jones in the Alumni Office and let us know of your interest. We will be happy to answer any questions.

Please stay well and safe so that we can all gather together once again at our Home, Boys Town, in July of 2022.

Boys Town's Shaquil Barrett, '10, Wins Second Super Bowl Ring

haquil Barrett will be getting the second Super Bowl
Championship ring of his young career after the Tampa
Bay Buccaneers defeated the Kansas City Chiefs, 31-9, in Super Bowl LV.
Barrett was a key component of a Tampa Bay defense that held the highpowered Chiefs offense to no touchdowns, a first in quarterback Patrick
Mahomes' NFL career. Barrett was officially credited for one sack and four of
the team's 10 total hits/hurries against Mahomes. The Chiefs quarterback was
pressured 29 times, which was a Super Bowl record.

"They were the better team today," Mahomes said. "They beat us pretty good, the worst I think I've been beaten in a long time."

Barrett won his first Super Bowl ring with the Denver Broncos in 2016. This was Barrett's second season with Tampa Bay.

GEORGE PFEIFER, '44

George Pfeifer, who coached basketball and track teams to state championships at Boys Town, passed away on Wednesday, February 3, 2021.

Pfeifer began his lifelong association with

Boys Town as a youth in August of 1940. His father had passed away, and he and two brothers, Robert and Alfred, came to Boys Town from Hays, Kansas.

Pfeifer was a member of Boys Town's varsity basketball team. His popularity was such that he was elected mayor in July of 1943. Upon graduation in 1944, he enlisted in the Navy. At the completion of his service in World War II, Pfeifer enrolled at Fort Hays State and completed his undergraduate degree in 1951. Following a stint as a coach at Fort Hays, Pfeifer was called by his old coach, Skip Palrang, to head back to Boys Town and become a member of the coaching staff and a teacher. He eventually became head basketball and head track

coach. During his tenure as basketball coach, he notched back-to-back Class A state championships in 1965 and 1966, after leading the 1954 track team to a Class A state championship.

Pfeifer was inducted into the Boys Town Alumni Sports Hall of Fame at its inaugural event in 2005. This honor was followed up in 2006 by his induction into the Nebraska High School Hall of Fame.

Geraldine B. "Jerri" Novotny passed away on January 31, 2021. Jerri, along with her late husband, Ed Novotny, '43, were the "corporate memory" for the Alumni

Association for years.

Jerri could normally be found in her small office space in the Alumni Office, meticulously poring over the financial records of the Association, tracking lifetime membership payments and sending notes and letters to alumni all over the world. Her commitment to the mission of the BTNAA was deep and abiding. She worked in administrative positions at Boys Town headquarters, all the while staying fully engaged with alumni matters.
