Phil Dauterive, D'70, Elected to Lead Boys Town Alumni Association Board

Phil Dauterive, D'70, was elected Boys Town National Alumni Association President during the recent Alumni Reunion in July. Officers and new board members were announced at the General Assembly.

Besides Dauterive, officers elected for the 2017-2019 term are: Vice President, Larry Adams, '68; Secretary, Lisa Morehouse-Mabey, '89; and Treasurer, Steve Postert, '69

The BTNAA begins Boys Town's second century with a new board structure to better represent the membership of the group. Over the past two years, the board of directors worked diligently to create a board structure that is more encompassing of the broad range of years represented by the membership.

The new structure is made up of different groups by their years of graduation. It was put into place to get a more equitable representation and give voice to a broader range of members. The groups and their board representation are: 5–15 Year Group, one member; 16–25 Year Group, two members; 26–35 Year Group, two members; 36–45 Year Group, three members; 46+ Year Group, 2 members; and At-Large, one member, for a total of 11 members on the board.

Nominations for the open positions on the board were held in May and elections were held by secret ballot throughout the months of June and July, with ballots being counted at the General Assembly.

The second position in the 16–25 Year Group did not have an eligible candidate elected so the board of directors will appoint an eligible representative from that group to the position at their September 2017 meeting.

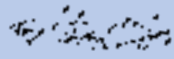

Boys Town’s Most Prestigious Awards Presented at Alumni Banquet

The Boys Town National Alumni Association announced its most prestigious award winners for 2017 at the reunion’s Saturday night banquet at the Embassy Suites in La Vista. A more complete biography of each of the award winners can be found on the Alumni website.

Father Flanagan Distinguished Alumnus Award

Judge William D. “Bill” Maddux, ’53, arrived at Boys Town in September of 1948. While at Boys Town, Maddux was an outstanding and well-rounded citizen, participating in sports and student governance.

Maddux has been a longtime and committed supporter of Boys Town and the Boys Town National Alumni Association. He was a member of the Boys Town National Board of Trustees for over 20 years. He and his wife, Debra, donated one of the new homes at Boys Town when the campus was expanding its residential home program. He is a past president of the Boys Town National Alumni Association and a Lifetime Member.

Outstanding Young Alumnus Award

Mary Carter, ’03, arrived at Boys Town in the fall of 2000, committed to changing her life’s less-than-constructive path. She embraced Boys Town’s program of care. Her success in school,

athletics and Junior ROTC led her to choose a career in the United States Air Force.

She is presently stationed at Aviano Air Base, Italy, on deployment in Afghanistan. Carter is a Lifetime Member of the Boys Town National Alumni Association.

The President’s Award

Edward J. “Ed” Flanagan, ’81, arrived at Boys Town in 1973 after the untimely death of his mother.

In 1990, he was appointed to the BTNAA Scholarship Fund Board of Directors.

In 1999, Flanagan joined the BTNAA Board of Directors and was appointed by then-President Ken Suddeth, ’66, to chair a committee to investigate and measure the interest in a movement to canonize Father Flanagan. That effort has reached heights only imagined when the committee was first formed.

Honorary National President

Norbert “Knobby” Meyensburg began his life-work at Boys Town in 1957 and worked as a Cottage Counselor in Cottage 27 for 17 years. In 1976, Meyensburg was appointed Director of Boys Town’s Camp Lake Okoboji, a position he held until 1992.

Hall of History Inductees Announcement Highlights General Assembly Meeting

Three Hall of History inductees highlighted the announcement of award winners at the Boys Town National Alumni Association’s General Assembly on Saturday morning, July 15, 2017.

Hall of History Inductees

Robert D. Keeder, ’63, arrived at Boys Town from Jackson, Michigan, on September 29, 1960. He was a member of the Boys Town Choir.

Keeder represented Region 5 on the BTNAA Board of Directors, serving two terms as President. It was under his leadership, and that of Joe Ortega, ’47, that the BTNAA Lifetime Membership program was conceived and implemented. He is a Lifetime Member of the BTNAA.

Andrew C. “Andy” Olivo, ’66, arrived at Boys Town on October 11, 1961, from El Paso, Texas. He immediately got involved in sports. He was a member of the first Boys Town football team to win a state championship. That team went 10-0.

Olivo is a strong supporter of the Boys Town National Alumni Association, having served as a board member and President. He was elected to the Boys Town National Board of Trustees. He is a Lifetime Member of the BTNAA.

Reginald E. “Reggie” Walton, ’67, arrived at Boys Town on February 18, 1960, from Saint Louis, Missouri. He exhibited a talent for singing, sports and leadership. He found his niche in the swimming pool, becoming a three-year varsity

letterman in that sport.

Walton passed away on October 7, 2016, his 68th birthday. He was a Lifetime Member of the BTNAA.

Alumni Service Awards

Gene Horan, ’57, has long been a supporter of the Association. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the BTNAA Scholarship Fund, former member of the BTNAA Board of Directors and a retired teacher and coach from Boys Town High School. He is a Lifetime Member of the BTNAA.

Albert M. “Bo” Rhudy, ’60, is chairman of the BTNAA Sports Hall of Fame Committee and a former board member representing Region 2. He is a strong and loyal advocate for Boys Town and the Boys Town National Alumni Association. He is a Lifetime Member of the BTNAA.

Jason Suibielski, ’81, has served as a valuable volunteer in updating the alumni database. His work has resulted in adding thousands of names to the BTNAA directory and discovering dates of death and identifying alumni who were killed in action or who died while serving in uniform. The 27 names being added to the Veterans’ Memorial this year were found by Suibielski. He is a Lifetime Member of the BTNAA.

Carol Trevino is a dedicated and longtime member of the Boys Town National Alumni Association Auxiliary. She has served in a number of positions with the Auxiliary, including President.

Alumni Profile

Tony Wish, ’69

Anthony “Tony” Wish, ’69, was living in a tough neighborhood in South Omaha and was heading down a troubled path when his mother and Catholic Charities intervened to place him at Boys Town just before the start of the school year in the fall of 1962.

It was a move that he said changed his life for the better.

At first, Wish said he had difficulty adjusting to life in the dormitory at Boys Town.

“I soon learned getting along was a key to staying out of trouble,” Wish said. “I ran away a few times but found Boys Town was my best option.”

Sports played a role in helping Wish adapt to Boys Town. He played on the midget football team coached by Scott Clark.

“I went on my first jet airplane ride to Philadelphia to play in the Liberty Bowl, a game which we won,” Wish said.

By the time Wish reached Boys Town High School, he worked harder on his academics and played football. He especially enjoyed learning the electronics trade under Ralph Forke.

After graduation, Wish found he had a talent for construction.

“I started my own business in 1973 and called it A-1 Construction,” Wish said. “I also married my wife, Laima, and we had three beautiful

children. My best job was when our company submitted the winning bid for the remodel of Eagle Hall on the Boys Town campus. We gutted the building and made it more adaptable to family-style living for the girls who were admitted to the Home.”

Wish also enjoyed a renovation of the Great Hall (High School Dining Hall).

During the renovation, he salvaged several of the tiles depicting sports activities. He recently made a set of plaques with the tiles mounted on them. He said they bring back fond memories of his youth at Boys Town.

Wish sold his construction business in 1989 and moved to Las Vegas, where he bought an automotive warehouse. He expanded it to four warehouses before selling it. In 2001, he started an electronics manufacturing company.

“I finally decided to make Ralph Forke, my old electronics teacher, proud by making use of the knowledge I gained in his classes,” Wish said.

While he ran that company, Father Peter called and asked Wish to participate in the opening of a satellite home in Las Vegas. Wish said it was good to see the Home expand to meet its mission to serve underprivileged kids.

In 2008, a Chicago company bought Wish out

Boys Town and Alumni Joe Renteria, '37, Celebrate 100 Together During Reunion



Boys Town Alumni celebrated along with fellow alum Joe Renteria during the July reunion.

They celebrated Renteria's 100th birthday right in the middle of the Home's 100-year celebration.

Renteria turned 100 on July 17 and celebrated with Boys Town youth during their lunch period at the Great Hall. Renteria was presented a birthday cake and was able to sit and talk with various students. He was also recognized Saturday evening at the Alumni banquet.

Renteria shared one of his favorite stories of his involvement with Father Edward Flanagan during his lunch with the Boys Town youth.

Renteria said he arrived at Boys Town as a rebellious child. As a Native American in the early 20th century, he was unwelcomed by many, and his attitude reflected the way he had been treated. Father Flanagan set the groundwork for his happy and meaningful life by welcoming him with open arms and teaching him the power of positive

thinking.

One particular conversation with Father Flanagan left a lasting impact on Renteria.

"Father Flanagan took me to the side and said, 'I'm not going to order you or tell you what to do, but since you're one of the older boys, it would be very encouraging to the younger boys if you attended church,'" Renteria said. He was not Catholic or very spiritual at the time, but he attended Mass once a month to set a good example. He said the way Father Flanagan asked made all the difference.

By reaching his own impressive milestone, Renteria serves as a link to Boys Town's past and a witness to its present and future. He says Boys Town showed him

where family life begins.

"Being in a family setting is good," Renteria said. "The way things are set up now here at Boys Town is the way it should be. A hug feels so good. That little sign shows that someone genuinely cares about you. That is the way it should be, and I hope that is the way it will continue forever."

and he decided it was time to retire.

"My wife and I moved to Coaldale, Colorado, and today we live the Colorado dream," Wish said. "Fighting boredom, I built a large shop and now build custom pieces of furniture and do a lot of artwork. My pieces are in a gallery in Salida, Colorado."

Wish said he is forever thankful for what Boys Town did for him.

"We all remember how difficult it was to receive discipline and apply it to our lives," he said. "However, if we look back, we can see this was what made us what we are today. I thank God that someone had the vision to send me to the Home and help me become a responsible and contributing adult. That never would have happened without the discipline I received at Boys Town."
